It has certainly been a hectic summer here in Richmond . . . Some of you may not be aware that my mother gave us quite a scare this Summer. In mid-July she developed a back pain so intense that she was transported via ambulance to Williamsburg Community Hospital. Initially, she was treated by her orthopedic doctor with pain killers and anti-inflammatory drugs but her GP noted that she had a fever. He examined her and ordered a blood test that showed the existence of a staph infection. He immediately began treatment with antibiotics, but she continued to get worse. Additional testing revealed that the infection was in her urine and in the fluid in her knee joint, but no test could determine the cause or source of the infection. As she continued to slide, they finally performed a spinal tap on Friday, July 26 and confirmed that the infection had also invaded the spinal fluid. She had meningitis.

Suspecting that the infection was sited at the heart valves, the doctors recommended that she be transported to the

Medical College of Virginia (MCV) here in Richmond so that a trans-esophageal echocardiogram could be performed to confirm their suspicions, and the facilities were available to perform emergency open-heart surgery if necessary. The doctor also recommended

that we prepare for the worst.

So at 11:00 pm, the ambulance sped off to MCV, with us in pursuit, and Alan, Deanne, et al. jumped in their car and headed south ... long night! Once she was stabilized in the ICU at MCV, we went home.

On Saturday morning, they completed the procedure and the doctor reported that test results were negative for heart

valve damage.

When I visited her after the procedure, I could clearly see an improvement in her condition. Apparently, during the night, she had reached a turning point where the antibiotics finally kicked in and her body was fighting back. By the time Alan arrived that afternoon, she was sufficiently coherent so as to be surprised by his presence. Alan stayed the weekend, returning home by train on Monday morning while Deanne and the kids stayed with Monica for a week. Alan returned the next weekend and took his family home.

Mom's recovery and some rehabilitation at MCV took 25 days. On August 21, she went home. Unfortunately, the back pain

she started with persisted, requiring her to use a walker and other assist devices to move around.

After being home less than a week, she went back to the hospital (Williamsburg) because she was feeling lightheaded. Turns out she was three pints low on blood as a result of a gastric ulcer (most likely due to all of the medications she was taking). Although they were quick to "top her off" with transfusions and get the ulcer under control, the doctors in Williamsburg wanted to identify the cause of her back pain before they discharged her. (MCV didn't seem to care about her total well-being). They performed a bone scan and found nothing but arthritis in her lower back, shoulders, knee and wrist. Because she had spent another week immobilized in bed, the doctors had her transferred to Williamsburg Rehabilitation A across the street from the hospital. She will stay there for three weeks ('til Sept 26?) until her regiment of antibiotic injections is complete and she has had an opportunity to work her back so that she can move around at home.

We are finally in our new church! The dedication of St. Michael's Catholic Church took place on Tuesday night, March 26. With the first two weekends in the place being Palm Sunday and Easter, the overwhelming crowds of folks who descended on the church were expected. After the P&P Catholics went back into hibernation and summer vacations started, attendance lightened. Now that summer is over, the crowds have returned and we fill the 550 seat worship space at each Mass. Plans to start on Phase II

(1000 seat worship space) are being accelerated.

Claudine became one of the three young Head Ministers to assist at the 5:30 PM Sunday Mass, which our Pastor is hoping to make into a Youth Mass. Claudine continues to sing in the church choir. At school, she is involved in the drama club and had a part as one of the singer/dancers in the spring production of Bye, Bye, Birdie. She also played softball again with the school JV team, and with the community girls' league, but she chose not to play with her dad on the St. Mike's Defenders team. She also received her drivers license in April, but has been slow to take advantage of it. She has been timid about getting behind the wheel and refused repeated offers to practice with the manual transmission. With my mother out of action, we have her Camry, which Claudine is driving from time-to-time.

This past semester, Chris came home only once, for his spring break. He wanted to come home for two events at the Church (Confirmation Retreat and Dedication), but those trips were thwarted by bad weather and the need to concentrate on his schoolwork. He spent the summer working at Burger King. On August 23, we took him back to Blacksburg to start his second year.

Overall, he's doing well, but math has become a problem for him.

Softball season has ended for again, and although both the K of C and St. Michael's teams did better than last year, we still ended up dead last in both the Henrico County Men's League and the Henrico Church Mixed League, respectively. All I can say is that

I did my part.

Re-Engineering of the Nuclear department at Virginia Power is drawing to a close. The first phase examined the so called "non-strategic" groups, including Security, Training, Records Management, Human Resources, etc. Those groups were hit hard, with staff reductions of from 20Ä4O%. The second phase looked at the station Operations and Maintenance staffs. As expected, this effort was over in a hurry and resulted in very few changes or layoffs.

As for Nuclear Engineering, I served with eight representatives from other Engineering groups and three consultants on the redesign team. The team was assembled in late April and worked through to August 15, when our recommendations were made to

management.

The key themes in our redesign effort were "rightsizing" for the reduced capital improvement spending at our stations, and a transition to a "proactive" Engineering organization. "Rightsizing" resulted in the proposed total reduction of 60 positions (from 349), however, we increased staffing in the "proactive" plant support area by 10. Of the 50 positions we identified for reduction, most are vacancies, contract clerks, and co-ops. Therefore, few Engineers will actually leave the Engineering organization and even fewer will hit the streets, due to the creation of new positions in other groups.

As for me, my group continues to exist, with the reduction of one Engineer, but the addition of two designer/draftsmen. So I

probably still have a job. We'll find out in mid October.

The usual quiet of our neighborhood has been shattered for the past nine months as construction is under way for the new Capital One credit card production/billing and support services facilities behind us. Every morning we feel like cursing Rudolf Diesel for his invention and OSHA for requiring backup alarms on construction vehicles (Don't those people ever drive forward?!)

In addition, the lot next to our house and the one across the street will be built upon soon. We're expecting construction to start at any time, but they'll probably wait for the construction behind us to complete to maximize the annoyance factor.

Well, that's about it for now!

What a lot of news - it's wonderful to learn all about your lives! Auntie Nana and all the other May siblings up in heaven must be pleading for us and cheering us on. Aunt Rosemasry sure had everyone here scared to death. We are all pulling for her and praying. Keep up that therapy Rosemary News like this makes me sorry I gave up driving so long ago or I might have been able to visit her. But not having a car does keep me solvent. 

Greetings from Virginia - from the house of the handicapped!

Can you imagine 2 people walking with a walker and sometimes a wheelchair getting around the house - sometimes we need a traffic cop!!!

Eric did a great job explaining my illnesses. I didn't know I was a candidate for open heart surgery. Eric says there's a lot I don't know about that first week. That week is gone from my memory - I was 'out of it'.

I'm home 2 months - I still have to use a walker. I still get stabbing pains in my back. I have a regimen of exercises to do daily. I finished one prescription of outpatient therapy doing bicycling for 15-25 minutes during each of the visits and the prescription will be renewed. My doctors suggested I go to see an osteopath/anesthesi-clogist who also evaluates people in pain. His diagnosis is that I have inflamed muscles and possible pinched nerves and suggested I get a steroid injection. My medical doctor doesn't want me to get an injection. He believes any invasion would possible stir up any infection or bacteria that may still be present and the meningitis may return. My doctor said I was a very sick woman, hospitalized P_2 months - and it will take double that time for me to be fully recovered and feel like my old self again. Like many diseases, there's no guarantee the meningitis won't return. So now my doctors are looking into my seeing a chiropractor. My orthopedic doctor knows a chiropractor who does work on students who are injured in sports at William and Many College. He is to explain my case to him and get back to me. That's what I am uniting for.

She got help from a neighbor to put the garbage and recycling curbside each once a week - and they bring the newspaper and mail to the front door every day - and about 4 friends and neighbors to do shopping and transport her to the hospital to see me and then take her back home again - and also to take her to any appointments she had.

Monica has been doing most of the cooking and washing. I do what I can. I still can't drive - I have trouble getting into some cars. Thank goodness for friends who have bigger cars and they take me to my appointments.

Well, that's enough about us. Just keep the prayers going for my full recovery - and that Monica stays healthy. Thank you!

Happy Thanksgiving this Thursday. Eric and family will be coming with a full dinner, courtesy of Ukrop's, on Saturday. That's when we'll celebrate. Chris is home from college and we'll get to see him again.

We're awaiting the birth of Deanne's and Alan's 3rd child due in a few weeks - due in mid December.


