Dear Family,

Looks like I was caught with my pants down! Usually, I start working on the next installment for the letter soon after the letter leaves my house (I just keep adding and revising until the letter returns.) This time, I'm totally unprepared! Hmm . . . let me think!

We just came home from a weekend trip to Radford and VA TECH (Go, Hokies!!!) with Danie's parents. The primary purpose of the trip was to watch Claudine perform in the title role in Radford's Children's Theatre production of Snow White. Claudine was wonderful (of course!) in her first starring role. We finally took advantage of his student status and attended the VT/Clemson football game in October at Blacksburg. The energy in that crowd was incredible! We were horse for days after the game!

Danie continues to work with her buddy cleaning houses. They have become so popular that there is a waiting list for their services. She also continues to make quilts in her "spare" time. Recently, the quilting "circle" that she belongs to made an applique quilt that they donated to a Mennonite Relief organization to auction it off during their annual show in October. We attended the auction, in Harrisonburg, VA, and watched as the bidding took place. The winning bid was for \$1600 (one of the top five quilts).

If she's not quilting, she's tole painting or making glass jewelry or involved in some other craft.

As far as my little world goes, I became a Fourth Degree member of the Knights of Columbus at a weekend event in Williamsburg in November. There were 309 brother Knights in addition to myself, all dressed in our tuxedos, for the conference of the degree. It was quite a production!

During a recent general physical examination, I complained to my doctor about being tired all of the time and nodding off to sleep at work. Danie's descriptions of my loud snoring and occasional gasping for air at night were symptoms of obstructive sleep apnea (OSA), a condition where one stops breathing during sleep because their airway (i.e., the back of the throat) closes up. I was referred to a sleep clinic, where I had a sleep evaluation performed during an overnight session. I was fully instrumented with electrodes, microphones, oxygen sensors, airflow sensors strain gauges before I was sent to my room to get some "sleep". Well, all the gadgets confirmed that I do have OSA (I stopped breathing over 20 times per hour!). The "fix", at least for now, is to use a continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machine, essentially an expensive, calibrated blower that pushes air into my nose while I'm asleep to keep my throat from closing. The contraption looks unwieldy, with a blower the size of a shoebox attached to an air tube attached to a nasal mask which is strapped onto my face, but I've actually gotten used to using it. Danie can actually get some peaceful sleep for a change, now that I'm not snoring and gasping. In the long term, hopefully I will lose enough weight that the fatty tissue in my throat will be reduced to the point that my airway will stay open on its own. But that's going to take some time. (I did lose 20 lbs in 6 weeks, but hit a brick wall and have been struggling just to keep my weight at that point - especially with the Holidays upon us!)

Work is getting exciting again. Virginia Power's holding company, Dominion Resources is merging with Consolidated Natural Gas. This merger will make us one of the five largest energy companies (gas & electric) in the United States. The merger will have little affect on the Nuclear Business Unit, but other portions of the company are bracing for the expected consolidation of personnel between the two companies, and the inevitable layoffs. What will affect us more is the recent deregulation legislation that was passed in Virginia. In 2002, Nuclear and Fossil & Hydro will cease to be part of Virginia Power and will become Dominion Generation as the generation assets are spun off. The non-regulated generating assets of the current Dominion Energy will be combined with the former Virginia Power assets and new generation that is being built for Consolidated Natural Gas to form one big generating company.

A special welcome to the cyberworld for Aunt Claire, who now has her very own e-mail address! (I never thought I'd see the day!!) We've "conversed" several times.

I can't believe that my godchild, Stephanie is getting married! And Ria & Alex are gonna be grandparents!? I'm glad I'M not getting older!!

I'm glad to hear that everyone is so excited about the family reunion next year. Danie and I have put it on our calendar, but I can't speak for the "kids". Lord knows where they'll be come next July!

Then on Friday I got the car out and went shopping. Eckerd, the pharmacy, was not too bad, just a little patch of snow or ice here and there. But Winn-Dixie's road in front of the store was not even shoveled. But I got a spot not too bad and an empty cart was across the road so I took it to help me get across to the store. Coming out with a filled cart a nice young man helped me to the car. He said to me, "You're from New York!" I said, "Yes." He was from Long Island - in Smithtown. I told him I was born in Brooklyn - he was born in the Bronx. I thanked him for his help and he said, "It was a pleasure!" We Northerners stick together and help each other.

We were to have another storm this past weekend. But all we got was a dusting of snow and light rain. We were lucky - the storm veered to the west and skirted us.

Since I last wrote in the RR last March, I started bowling, but only 1 game a week - the doctor said - slow and easy.
