09/17/06
Ernesto did harm to the Round Robin letter in my mailbox but it did no harm to my house this time. It did leave quite a big branch across my driveway, but it did not touch any part of the house. I could not get out of my garage until the branch was taken away by some nice neighbors.

Monica is in Regency Healthcare Center, 112 No. Constitution Drive, Yorktown, VA 23692, which is about 30 minutes from here. She had home health care nurses coming in at least 3 x a week, sometimes more often, because the wound on her toe which never really healed. On $8 / 23$, a home health nurse saw her leg was red, swollen and warm (cellulitus). The nurse called our doctor, who ordered her into the ER (8/23), was admitted into the hospital and after 4 days, she was admitted into the nursing home in Yorktown - they had a bed for her. We did not want to use either of the 2 nursing homes here in Wmbg. - they do not have good reputations. The one Monica is in, has had a good reputation for a long time. She is there for short term rehab care, 3 months - after that, we'll see how Monica is - maybe stay there permanently. She needs nursing care and I can't help her. She is doing pretty well - knows just about everyone on the staff and gets along fine with them. When and if Monica is placed wherever permanently, we (me, Eric and Alan) are thinking of selling my house and I would go into an independent living or assisted living place. Then I wouldn't have to worry about things around the house and the expense of paying for things that have to be fixed - and I wouldn't be living alone!

Alan and Deanne and family were here August $14^{\text {th }}$ to $21^{\text {st }}$. Eric and Danie came on Friday, the $18^{\text {th }}$, so there was a mini May Family Reunion that day. The day Alan left here is when Eric and Danie started their vacation to visit Alaska (Aug. 21 to Sept. 2). When all the family was here, we were talking about nursing homes for Monica and assisted living places for me: Alan and I visited Regency to see what it is like and we thought it was a nice place. Little did we know then that Monica would be in the hospital and then nursing home so soon. Me, I'm still using Duragesic (pain patches) and taking Vicodin for pain and the doctor is thinking of another epideural on my spine. I'm glad I can still drive and I still walk with the aid of my walker.

It was sad hearing the news of Ed and Betty - the good part is that they passed away peacefully in their sleep. Helen will probably be placed in a nursing home. Most of the family have good news to pass on to all. Some have troubles that are trying to be resolved - they will - and that is good. That's life!

Yesterday Eric and I went to see Monica. We got new cell phones and Eric was 'teaching' us (with some difficulty) how to use the new one. Every phone is different - why can't they make them all the same and only with options you want - not all the other 'stuff' that's possible to have with the phones - and a little bigger! We'll try! - and hopefully do what we are supposed to do - we'll learn! But Eric thinks the nursing home is nice and Monica seems to be happy there - gets along with everybody and doesn't mind that we have to leave her there. She's been like that even when I go alone to visit her - she knows she stays and I go.

We send our love. You are in our thoughts and prayers.

There is much going on in the William May branch of the Family.
The most important is that Monica was transferred from Regency Health Care to Mary Immaculate Hospital in Yorktown. She was unresponsive and the staff could not give her scheduled medications. She was diagnosed with sepsis, which is very dangerous. While we do not know the cause, as I write this, she seems to be responding; though certainly not back to the way she was prior to the episode.
For Alan, the heart surgery we postponed in Aug 04 is now set to occur Jan 24 at Westchester Medical Center. The five blockages have progressed, even though my bad cholesterol has been in the $31-50$ range. The surgeon said that everyone focuses on cholesterol because it is the only cause of heart disease doctors can do anything about. But heredity plays a much larger role. So, in a few weeks | should be recovering from the surgery and rebuilding my strength. I should no longer have to worry about the heart, other than to monitoring it periodically. You will hear how that goes.

We spent the days between Christmas and New Years at Mom's in Williamsburg. We helped move her to Chambrel at Williamsburg (note her new address on the front of the RR), in their independent living program. She has a spacious apartment although she is having trouble finding a home for all the stuff we moved there from the house!) It has two entrances. She can park right in front and walk across the lawn to her back door. She knows many people there from St. Bede Church, and there is even a bus from Chambrel to the Church each Sunday. There are many other activities as well, from fitness to a library to games to music, etc. Most important, she is not alone in a big house that requires constant maintenance. Although she has not had peace since moving in the "stuff" to sort through, and now Monica's condition, every indication is that she will love it there. She has had dinner with several residents and is meeting new people.
As we left Williamsburg, we took a 10 foot truck filled with some of the other stuff from Mom's house. We are sorting through that at our already overflowing house.

Other news:
Other than preparing for surgery, Alan continues to lead children's liturgy and may be involved in a Lenten program if it ever gets organized. Work remains a stressful environment which is not good for my conditions, but it pays the bills. There aren't too many alternatives for a 50 year old in this industry.
Deanne is on break from Mercy College for most of Jan. Unfortunately, she goes back to work just as Alan has his surgery. She is sorting through Mom's stuff and trying to clear a place for me to stay during days following surgery. She is also more and more involved with programs at Sacred Heart. She began an RCITeen group with our new priest and has 10 participants. She runs the sacramental and the Religious Ed programs as well as the Spiritual Life committee. No free time here.
Billy has begun playing his new wind controller at the Saturday 5PM Mass @ Sacred Heart. He has been taking lessons from the musician for the Church and now is getting a chance to show his stuff to the parish. He is getting great reviews. Unfortunately, the rest of us generally go to the 10 AM Mass Sunday, which is the Children's Liturgy, and afterwards is Religious Ed we are all involved in. While we talk about colleges, we have done nothing concrete to decide where that next phase of his life will unfold. We presume he will remain at home, but other options are open to him. He will probably be able to go wherever he wants, and we have good reason to hear about scholarships. He is still involved in the scout troop as Junior Assistant Scoutmaster. He keeps the new scoutmaster on track
Gillian has developed into a pretty good bowler for the Sacred Heart team. Last year, she was happy to break 100. This year, she is consistently in the $120+$ range.
